Our dedication for the display of Private Hiram Wescott's memorabilia at Nottawa Township Library on October 9 was sparsely attended, but well received by those who were there. If you have not visited the collection you should make it a point to do so. You will find it time well spent.

Brother John Dudd is recovering from two hernia surgeries over this last summer. He has not been able to get out and about for some time while he has been recovering. It sounds as if he will continue to be laid up for several more weeks, but is on the mend. Please keep Brother John in your thoughts and prayers.

A little about Private Hiram Wescott:

Hiram Wescott was born in Lockport Township on September 28, 1843 the son of William and Sarah Wescott. He was orphaned at the age of six and was raised by relatives. On August 24, 1861, just short of the age of eighteen he answered his country's call and enlisted into Company A of the Eleventh Michigan Infantry.

The regiment was organized and trained in White Pigeon and was mustered into service on September 24, 1861. The regiment departed White Pigeon on December 9 for Bardstown Kentucky where they were assigned to railroad guard to July of 1862. Following this assignment they began to see heavy action, fighting in 18 battles including Stone's River, Chickamauga, the assault on Kenesaw Mountain ending with service in the Siege of Atlanta when their three year term of service ran out in September 1864. The regiment was mustered out on September 30, 1864 in Sturgis. Many re-enlisted in the reorganized Michigan Eleventh; however 320 had had enough fighting and stayed home. Private Wescott was one of these returning to Centreville to learn the trade of harness making and opening his own business. He married Marion W. Hewings who preceded him in death on October 1, 1931.

In all, of the roughly 1,300 men who left White Pigeon, the Regiment lost 5 officers and 107 enlisted men killed or mortally wounded, and 2 officers and 194 enlisted men to disease for a total of 308 casualties.

Private Wescott was active in the David Oakes Post of the Grand Army of the Republic until it was disbanded due to its ranks being depleted. He attended many GAR encampments; and many of his souvenirs are in this display here. He was also an active attendee of reunions of the 11th Michigan Infantry. At the age of 90 years, four months and 24 Private Wescott passed away on February 22, 1934. He was the last surviving member of the GAR in Centreville.
