Michigan's GAR Museum

Michigan's Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Hall and Museum will host its annual 4th of July Civil War living history event on GAR Island in Eaton Rapids. Reenactors are invited to participate and interact with the public. Hudson's Battery (Battery B, 1st Michigan Light Artillery) will be present to demonstrate cannon firing. Reenactors who would like to participate can visit the museum's Facebook page and find the preregistration information. The public is invited to this free event, following the annual independence Day parade in Eaton rapids.

The museum is also preparing for its annual Civil War Day of Discovery. On Wednesday, Aug. 14, a daylong event for 8 to 12 year - olds will take place on GAR Island in Eaton Rapids, from 10am to 3pm. The cost is \$20 per child and lunch will be provided. The children will learn about the life of a soldier, learn the basics of drill and participate in a battle. Each child, with the permission of a parent or guardian, will have the opportunity to fire a Civil War musket assisted and supervised by a reenactor, with the child pulling only the trigger. Graves Registration Update

It was announced at the May Camp meeting that there were a significant number of cemeteries listed in each county within the camp's area of responsibility which showed no record of Civil War soldier burials. These included: Kalamazoo County-16 cemeteries, Allegan County-24 cemeteries, Van Buren County-4 cemeteries and Kent County 20 cemeteries. It is assumed, for a variety of reasons, that some of these cemeteries actually do not contain Civil War burials. However, each needs to be surveyed in detail to assure that our records are complete.

Over the past 60 days several Camp 20 brothers have volunteered their time and efforts to survey these target cemeteries. This has resulted in the additional of Civil War soldiers as outlined below:

In addition to the above new registrations, two cemeteries were surveyed and removed from the target list as containing no appropriate burials. This priority project is proceeding at a steady pace and is picking up momentum as additional Camp Brothers volunteer and the weather becomes more cooperative.





Orcutt Monument

Benjamin Orcutt was a veteran of both the Mexican War and the Civil War. He served as Lt. Col of Kalamazoo's own 13th Michigan Infantry Regiment. He survived both wars and was elected as Sheriff of Kalamazoo immediately following the Civil War. Sadly, in 1867 he was murdered in a jail break and his assailant was never found. The G. A. R Post in Kalamazoo was named after him.

Buried in the Mountain Home Cemetery, Orcutt's monument and gravestone sit facing W. Main Street and have been exposed to 150 years of auto exhaust and other road and neighborhood pollutants. His marble monument was created with a limestone base and both definitely show the effects of age and pollution. It was apparent that this would be very difficult to clean as the stains were deeply imbedded in the stone, yet we wanted to avoid significant surface brushing to avoid eroding the stone any more than time and weather have already accomplished. Ultimately, we were forced to try the poultice method for removing most of the worse stains.

Some areas of the monument were so deeply stained black that they defied cleaning, so we created a poultice from Orvus Paste, wrapped it with plastic wrap, and recleaned it after waiting for 24 hours.



The first stage of the Orcutt monument cleaning produced significantly improved results and the poultice application around the center of the monument resulted in substantial whitening of the ring. Therefore, we will add a second cleaning preceded by a poultice application in a larger area in the near future.



GAR Presentation to Kiwanis



Brother Gary Gibson PCC PDC presented a program in June to the Sunrise Kiwanis of Kalamazoo on the history of the GAR. This presentation was followed by a tour of the Riverside GAR lot and the biographies of many of the Civil War soldiers buried in the lot.

Recently a local citizen requested the camp's help in resetting her Civil War ancestors gravestone. The gravestone of Pvt. Lindsley B. Hutton of Co. F, 113 Ohio Infantry,

which is located in the Genesee Prairie Cemetery in Oshtemo, MI had sunken into the ground where much of its face was obscured. The stone was in danger of eventually disappearing altogether as only 10 inches of the tablet stone was visible above

ground. Brothers Robert Townsend, Michael Culp, Gary
Swain and Sister Patti
Townsend unearthed
the stone, and reset
and cleaned it.

Camp 20 Supports DAR Dedication

The Lucinda Hinsdale Stone Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution reset, cleaned and placed a marker for Revolutionary War soldier and early Michigan and Kalamazoo pioneer Ezekiel Ransom. Ransom served in both the Vermont Militia and the 6th Massachusetts Regiment. He was also the father of Epaphroditus Ransom, the only Michigan governor from Kalamazoo.

The dedication was held on Sunday, June 9, 2019 and was well attended including descendants of Ezekiel Ran-

som. Our camp was represented by Commander Michael Culp, PCC John Keith, PCC Gary Swain and Brothers Tom Bruce, Jay Miller, Dave Delemme and Rick Leber. Camp 20 Brothers Culp and Swain also provided material support and training in gravestone cleaning.

Happy Independence Day



July 4th, 1863

Vicksburg, Mississippi

On July 4th, 1863 the Battle of Gettysburg had been over for a day when Union General Ulysses S. Grant notified President Lincoln that Vicksburg, Mississippi had surrendered its last bastion on the Mississippi River. Strategically, even more important than Gettysburg, Vicksburg was an important rail hub and a bastion controlling the bluffs overlooking and controlling traffic on the Mississippi. Grant's conquest of Vicksburg split the Confederacy in half, allowed complete control and usage of the Mississippi River to the Union and captured over 30,000 Confederate troops.
