GAR Flag Holder

amp 20 brothers are regularly involved in veteran gravestone preservation activities in local cemeteries.

It is not uncommon to see original GAR flag holders which were originally provided by local GAR Posts for their deceased members. The most common holder is the five point star design. The



five point star was first introduced with the U. S. Flag Act of 1777. The original flag holders were usually constructed of "White Bronze" which is really a zinc alloy similar to the grave markers which were sold during the same era of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. This material has proven to be very durable. However, like the actual gravestones the greatest danger comes from maintenance crews and with lawn mowers.

er from GAR Post 170, Department of New York. Unfortunately, the marker had been broker in half due to vandalism. Fortunately, Camp 20 Brother **Bill Costello** was able to repair the marker and it was placed in it's current location. He did an excellent job of repairing and preserving the flag holder and the repair is almost imperceptible. Baring any future accidents the flag holder should continue provide service for another century.

Bronson Park Monuments

Update







he City of Kalamazoo has made significant progress in the redesign and the creation of the Honor Walk in Bronson Park dedicated to the veteran memorials located within the park. The monuments have now been relocated to the arched walkway extending from the northeast corner of the park to the southeast corner. The walkway will be anchored by the Civil War era Columbiad cannon near the corner of Park and South Streets and the Spanish American War statue titled The Walker on the corner of Park and Academy Streets.

Current plans call for the SUVCW-Camp 20 to clean the base and repaint the cannon during the summer of 2020. Additionally, some light cleaning of two of the small G.A.R monuments (see right) are anticipated in the same time frame.

All of the monuments will be described in a new website that the City of Kalamazoo is creating. Camp 20 will provide the copy for all monuments within our purview.

Abel Peck

24th Michigan Volunteer Infantry (Iron Brigade)

bel Peck, at 42 years old, was a little older than the average recruit when he enlisted in then 24th Michigan Infantry Regiment in 1862. Life before the Civil War had not been easy for Abel. He had been married twice but had lost both wives and two infant daughters to natural causes. However, he did have two young daughters that had survived and were each being cared for by family or family friends.

Peck's maturity and faithfulness to duty were undoubtedly important factors that contributed to his promotion to sergeant. Soon he was awarded the high honor of being the first regimental flag

bearer by Col. Morrow who commanded the Michigan 24th Infantry Regiment.

Just before the march to Gettysburg he wrote to his young daughter Ella and addressed the dangers that awaited him.

"I expect to have to take my part, and if I fall you must not mourn for I think I am doing my duty and you must think that the honor of having a Father die in the defense of his country will make up for the loss you will sustain."

As the Battle of Gettysburg began on July 1, 1863 Union Maj.

General Reynolds rushed his troops to Seminary Ridge and on to McPherson's Woods with the 24th Michigan anchoring the extreme left. They tore into the flank of Archer's Confederate brigade in desperate combat and ultimately forced Archer to surrender. Unfortunately, Sergeant Abel G. Peck was one of the first to fall. Later, Col. Morrow would write: "I have lost my color bearer, Abel G. Peck, a brave and faithful soldier....a man greatly admired for his almost saintly character." When the day"s fighting had ended, ten men had carried the flag of the 24th Michigan: five were killed and two others were wounded. The flag itself was shot through with twenty-three bullet holes, and the flag staff was shattered. The regiment entered the battle with 496 soldiers. By the end of the day they suffered 363 casualties including ninety four killed or mortally wounded. They suffered more casualties than any other regiment at the Battle of Gettysburg. Abel Peck is buried in an unmarked grave at Gettysburg National Cemetery.

PRESIDENTS' DAY

residents Day is the third Monday in February. Since the Uniform Holiday Act of 1971, it is an official holiday and celebrates the birthday of our first president, George Washington. While Washington's actual birthday is February 22nd., some states also celebrate Lincoln's birthday on the same third Monday even though Lincoln was born on February 12th. Michigan is not one of those states and officially celebrates only Washington on Presidents Day. Nevertheless, Camp 20 honors both Washington and Lincoln on Presidents Day. Many consider the these two men as America's two greatest presidents.
