I hope the first issue of the MESSENGER was well received. As with any project of this size, money is the major limiting factor. The first newsletter cost us \$48.00 to print and \$52.20 in postage. We have enough money in the Department treasury for a few more issues. We need to begin to think about ways to raise funds for the Department to pay for this newsletter, the recruiting brochures and the other projects we have in mind, if we want to continue these projects.

There are a few corrections from the last newsletter. John Mann, new Commander of the Austin Blair Camp #7, is the editor of their excellent newsletter. I have received telephone calls and letters as to this. Please accept my apology John, and again my hat is off to you on a job well done.

Secondly, the G.A.R. records are not in the Burton His-torical Library at the University of Michigan, but with the Burton Historical Collection that is part of the Detroit Public Library system. Having lived in Ypsilanti for several years and traveling several times to Ann Arbor to the Burton Historical Collection there, I made an assumption that was incorrect.

Finally, PDC Gary Gibson has pointed out to me that the GAR Grave Markers available is a Department project, not Camp 17.

#### **DEPARTMENT NEWS**

<u>DEPARTMENT RECORDS</u>: I have not had the opportunity to check out the Burton Historical Collection as of yet. This will probably be a winter project. It will have to wait, however, until the sale of my previous home in Sunfield. This seems to take up most of my Saturdays.

<u>UNIFORM</u>: Matter still open pending receipt of your views and suggestions. Both the Marshall and Jackson Camps are working on this idea. I am in hopes that we can adopt something Depart-ment wide. I will keep the options open to allow these Camps and any others that would like to contribute, time to submit recommendations.

I have received word from PDC Gary Gibson that the Corp badge was not used by the various Departments of the G.A.R., but adopted by the Sons of Veterans, U.S.A., for their Divisions, which are the present day Departments. He also believes the corp badge was red in color, not white. (Late addition - new word has been received as to the uniform of the Sons of Veterans. Look for the next issue of the MESSENGER for details).

HOWE CAMP: Due to the non-payment of per capita tax for over one year, the Howe Camp had been suspended. However, I recently received a letter from Commander Lavis and the Camp has been reinstated. While Commander Lavis is the only active member, I am hopeful that new recruits can be located and this become an active Camp again.

<u>DEPARTMENT MID-WINTER MEETING</u>: I had wanted to have a Department Mid-Winter membership meeting on February 20, 1993. I have made preliminary arrangements with a Lansing restaurant for a luncheon meeting, ordering from a menu. I recently called back to confirm and their offer was withdrawn. Therefore, much to my regret, this meeting is cancelled. I hope each of you can still attend the President's Day banquet the evening of February 20.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN/GEORGE WASHINGTON BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION: Once again, our Department is co-hosting with the Michigan Department, Sons of the Revolution, the annual February President's Birthday Banquet, honoring George Washington's and Abraham Lincoln's birthdays. This shall occur on February 20, 1993, with dinner at 6:30pm and program to follow. See the reservation form at the end of the Messenger.

<u>RECRUITMENT BROCHURES</u>: John Mann has made a Department recruiting brochure and Dick Williams and Don Everett met with John in late October to discuss the format, printing and distribution of the brochure. A draft should be ready for review soon.

GRAVES REGISTRATION PROJECT: The news from the Blair Camp (below) prompts me to point out that I created a new Department office and appointed James Lyons as the Department Graves Registration Officer. Jim has run a very successful program for the Curtenius Guard Camp in the Lansing/Tri-County area. He can answer questions such as what is available at the State Library, provide forms and instruction in searching cemeteries, completion of those forms and how to compile the data collected.

<u>FRUITPORT</u>: Preliminary meetings are occurring with the view of a new Camp in the Fruitport area.

#### CAMP NEWS

#### NATIONAL NEWS:

<u>COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF</u>: In his report to the 111th National Encampment, out-going Commander-in-Chief Lowell Hammer offered the following problem areas that he has identified. I believe Jim Lyons was going to make a full copy available to each Camp Commander should you desire to see the full report. C-in-C Hammer offers:

- We must have the commitment of everyone in the Order, not just a nucleus of a few loyal members.
- We must have officers who seek the position not simply for prestige, but who are willing to make serious contributions in time and effort to further the Order.
- We must engage in programs, projects and activities that respond directly to our purposes and objects.
- We must be willing to make changes in our traditional way of doing things if the situation, circumstances and times require it.
- We must not let petty differences or perceived slights within the Camp and Departments detract us from the accomplish-ment of our mission.
- We must make our Organization well known and attractive so that others who are eligible will wish to join it.
- We must improve our communication within the Order so that the membership will know what is going on at the National level and what other Departments and Camps are doing.

As I re-read these paragraphs, I can't help but feel proud of the accomplishments of the various Camps within the Department of Michigan. I do not see anything in the above areas that we are not working on. But, we must keep these areas in the fore-front of our mind and keep checking ourselves to ensure that we continue to promote the purposes of our Order, LEST WE FORGET.

SONS OF VETERANS RESERVE: Keith Harrison is on the recruiting warpath again. The Sons of Veterans Reserve is the military arm of the S.U.V.C.W. It has a long and honored history. The S.V.R. was activated for the Spanish-American War, with the S.V.R. battalions serving with distinction in our armies. A S.V.R. regiment also served our County during World War I and at other times.

Keith has been commissioned a Major in the S.V.R. and is forming the MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT SUVCW COLOR GUARD, S.V.R. This unit will assemble and serve the Department for parades and other appropriate ceremonial occasions. It will not become a reenactment unit, nor will it ever compete with any independent reenactment unit. Gary Gibson has been commissioned a First Lieutenant and will serve as the adjutant.

S.V.R. uniform is per U.S. Army 1861 regulations, with the enlisted ranks wearing the S.U.V. hat wreath upon the kepi. Any civil war reenactor desiring to enlist in the ranks may wear the enlisted rank they are entitled to in their reenactment unit. It is hoped this will help keep the costs down. Any non-reenactor enlisting in the ranks should contact Major Harrison for the rank they desire to wear.

Those desiring commissions must make application to the National organization, S.V.R., through and endorsed by Major Harrison and then have that rank approved by National. The National Commander, S.V.R., is a Brigadier General.

S.V.R. dues are \$3.00 per year, which is above your Camp dues. Membership in the S.V.R. is open to any member of the S.U.V.C.W.

THE BANNER: James Lee of Iowa has been replaced as the Editor of the Banner. Once again, Michigan has been recognized and Russell C. Gregory of the Curtenius Guard Camp #17 has been named the Banner Editor. Russ is the Editor of the Ionia Sentinel-Standard, a daily newspaper serving Ionia County. Russ has the ability and facilities to get the BANNER published and out to the membership on a quarterly basis. Congratulations Russ on your appointment. 
